The need for a sense of purpose amongst Christians

I began to write this Ad Clerum just before the October Paris attacks that so dominated the news, and that was followed by the Brussels attacks. It is interesting that Paris was chosen as a centre of vice and "of the Cross". I trust that you will enjoy both the piece on Christians and also the Diocesan news. +Michael, Southern Africa.

On Good Friday evening, I attended a most moving performance of J S Bach's *St Matthew Passion*, a brilliant, complicated work, sung by the South African Philharmonic Choir and orchestra. It was like observing a great piece of art or architecture, and realising that this is a part of our rich heritage as Christians.

I left the Linder Auditorium with mixed feelings. Firstly, the music had been very powerful, especially on Good Friday, but secondly, it reminded me that our church is in need of Christians who are passionate and have a sense of urgency about everything to do with their Faith. Let me tell you why.....

Wave after wave of Muslim people have been descending upon Europe, all seeking some kind of 'better life'. The Europeans have seemed powerless to deal with this flood of what are essentially illegal immigrants (*to use our terminology*). When some Orthodox Christian nations, Hungary and Macedonia, took a stand and closed their borders, everyone shouted at them as being nasty and discriminatory to the Muslim migrants. 2015 saw a concerted and well-orchestrated invasion by Islam of what were formerly Christian countries, and we would do well to take note of what is happening there. It made me wonder if, in a few years from now, Beethoven's *Missa Solemnis*, or Bach's *St Matthew Passion* won't be frowned upon as being too Christian, offending Muslims and other religions, and therefore undesirable pieces of music.....I don't think I will be wrong?

As a Christian, I am called to love my neighbour as myself, that I know, but as a Priest and Bishop, my first calling is to look after the flock of Christ. We have to begin to 'toughen up' our people, and make them aware of the huge machinery of international Islam that is pouring money into every part of the world and especially our beloved Africa, to bring about the downfall of the Christian Faith. Unless we, members of the Traditional Anglican Communion, together with other Christian churches, are prepared to give our all in the spreading of the Gospel, our children will grow up in a very different spiritual world. This really has become a desperate race for souls.

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Am I being melodramatic and alarmist? I think not. In the past few years we have seen the expansion of ISIS, or the Islamic State throughout the Middle East and North Africa. Large parts of Lybia and other North African regions are under their control. Throughout these areas of ISIS control, Christians of the "old churches", the Syriac Christians, The Eastern Orthodox Christians and the Coptic Orthodox Christians have come under the most horrifying and brutal persecution. Men, women and children have been tortured and slaughtered by Islamic State fighters, many thousands of whom have grown up and been educated in liberal European countries! Children's severed heads have been put up on poles, churches have been destroyed and whole communities decimated and displaced....these modern day Christians have found out, first hand, just how the so-called 'peaceful' religion of Islam does its business!



Above is an Icon, painted by *Nikola Saric*, a Serbian Christian living in Germany. It has been bought from the artist by the Coptic Orthodox Church. It depicts the beheading of 20 Coptic Orthodox Christians and their African companion, Mathew Arayiga, by Islamic State militants. The martyrs are in the customary orange overalls, and the Islamists in their black uniforms, faces obscured, knives brandished. They were beheaded in February 2015 – *not long ago* – for refusing to renounce their Faith in Jesus Christ, after 40 days of captivity by ISIS. It is a solemn reminder that following Christ could cost you everything....everything of *this* world, that is! A good reminder after the Easter liturgies.


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In the Second Century AD, there was a great persecution of the Christian faith. The Romans were brutal and cruel, and the religions of the day were fully involved in the murder and torture of many Christians. Ironically, it was the faith of the Martyrs of the Early Church that accelerated its growth, for the courage and steadfastness of our forefathers in the Faith became a shining example of great love and sacrifice.

One of the greatest writers of that time was a man called Tertullian, an outspoken critic of the Roman authorities. He said, "the more they cast us down, the more we will rise up....the blood of the Christian is the seed of the church!"

"Jesus Christ suffered for us, leaving us an example that we should follow in His steps..." These words of the Apostle Peter, remind us of the serious and radical nature of our calling as Christians. He, too, was martyred for his faith.

Men and women of God, your blessed Saviour has called you by name to be a true Disciple. The answer to that divine call is one of obedience and courageous faith. It is our time to show our mettle; what we as Christians are made of. My prayer is that your courage will be able to match your words.



All Saints Day, and All Souls Day reminded us of our place within the Family of the Redeemed. Easter reminded us of our eternal destiny. Remember before God, your faithful and courageous forebears, the Martyrs of the early church, and pray without ceasing for your 21st Century Christian Martyrs as they suffer for their Faith. They will receive the everlasting crown of glory from our blessed Saviour.

Confirmation at St Andrews Mondeor

Once again, the *Altar Project* has delivered high quality church requisites to our people and clergy. Particular thanks has to go to Dalene, who works tirelessly in the service of all the People of God in Southern Africa, producing altar linen, stoles and frontal sets. She is a faithful and true servant of the church.

The Patronal Festival itself was a splendid time, with well-prepared Confirmation Candidates and a vibrant fundraiser for the new parish. A Praise Singer (*see below*) added drama to the occasion, and Dalene was delighted and humbled by the ladies of the Mothers Union as they clothed her in traditional Xhosa clothing.

Maundy Thursday saw the Renewal of Priestly Vows and the Blessing of the Oils at Holy Cross Parish, Pretoria. This moving service was attended by 25 clergy from all over the country. A strong continent from as far as Eastern Cape attended, as did the clergy from Limpopo Province in the North and Qwa Qwa.

This was the largest number of clergy we have yet had for the Renewal of Priestly Vows, and many had travelled many hundreds of kilometres by public transport to be there. They arrived exhausted by their journey, and had to leave almost immediately to get back to their parishes for the Good Friday liturgies. This kind of devotion to God's Church is inspiring, and it shows the spirit of brotherhood and the deep commitment of our clergy.
